THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

I never wanted to be a Minister. Ask 5-year old me what they wanted to do and it would probably be a firefighter. Ask 15-year old me what they wanted to do, and he'd probably say teacher or something. 18-year old me was a photographer, and if you'd asked me in my mid 20's to early 30's what I wanted to do, I'd have probably said I was happy enough, as long as the job paid for the things I do like.

One of the things I did like was my involvement in my church in Dalgety Bay, and then later on in Kirkcaldy. It started off small, then over time I would be involved with putting together parts of services with our worship group, building a Tardis for the Sunday School (a very long story) and doing the things that help to make church happen - mainly moving furniture. But Ministry was never one of the things what really occurred to me. Ministry was for minister type people, and I certainly wasn't one of those.

It was only when my wife expressed an interest that I started giving the idea some thought. However it would take another few years before I finally gave in and responded to God's call with something not quite similar to Samuel's response, "Here I am Lord." Actually, I think it was more that I trusted God that if he wasn't calling me, the Church of Scotland would fling me out. So here I am, although I have often thought that the only reason I am here is because of a horrific mistake with the paperwork at the Church of Scotland... ©

However it's the characters in the Bible that have had unusual callings that resonate with me. Moses was a shepherd who had killed a man. Paul persecuted the early church. Both unlikely candidates for doing the Lord's work. The thing is, God calls us not for the work we have already done, but for our ability to be moved and shaped by him. We are clay in his hands.

The most important calling from God is for us to know him and to be drawn into fellowship with him. God calls people out of darkness into his light. When talking with Nicodemus about being born again. Jesus says, "The wind blows where it wishes, and so it is with everyone born of the Spirit" Gods power is blowing through us. It is only when we have truly drawn closer to God that we can try to understand out callings.

God's calling may not be for you to be a Minister, but think of all the ways you serve him. But also, reflect on the ways you could serve him better. We are all called to serve, using the skills He has blessed us with. And if you don't know about your calling, please just pause, and say, "here I am Lord" and listen. Interim Moderator At the Kirk Session Meeting held on 16 May, Rev Duncan MacPherson advised members that he was resigning from that position following the congregational vote. At the Presbytery Business Meeting on 13 June it was agreed that Rev James Bissett would take on the additional role of Interim Moderator. We are grateful to James for taking on this task.

Inverness Presbytery meet on Tuesday 27 June and will be asked to approve a deferred union for Old High St Stephen's. We will not be permitted to call a Minister. The charge will remain vacant until the Rev Douglas Robertson demits or retires from his post. There is much hurt in both congregations regarding the current situation but we should continue to work together as much as possible. We will keep you up to date with any developments. 

THE CLAVINOVA I've been asked to share the story of the Clavinova. A few months ago now, it was agreed by Session that one of our spare electric pianos would be gifted to Cameron House for use in services and concerts as the one they had was beyond repair – nobody was able to service it anymore. The plan was for us to drop off our piano and collect and dispose of theirs. Thanks to Stuart and Christine for the trailer and the heavy lifting.

As we are all aware, it's good to reduce, re-use and recycle, so instead of taking it on a final voyage to the tip, I took the old piano, a 22 year old Yamaha Clavinova home to attempt some repairs, on the theory that if it's dead, I can't make it any more dead. Now I'm not a musician, or a musical technician, but I do know how to read an instruction manual. There was a video on Youtube dedicated to the repair of the keys on this instrument, so I followed those steps. I had to remove all the keys individually, 88 of them, and greased them to free them up. The picture is partway through the process.
