#### THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

I have a lovely white tablecloth. It comes out for special occasions, and it's enormous. It will cover our dining table completely, with a lot left over. That dining table belonged to my parents who gave it to my then girlfriend, now wife, when my parents re-modelled their house. It was a huge table that expands, and was bought new, around 1978. But the table cloth is even bigger. We have to fold it in half, and then on top of that goes plates, bowls, glasses, cutlery etc. If anything is spilled, well we might give the cloth a soaking to prevent staining, but it's an accident, and it's a sign of a lovely meal. While we look after the good cloth, it's there to be used.

Back when I was training for Ministry, I remember my first communion where I was behind the table - I was never an elder, although for some strange reason, Kirkcaldy Presbytery was absolutely convinced that I was... On top of the white cloth had been placed a plastic sheet, protecting the white tablecloth. It was as my probation supervisor read the intimations that I noticed some marks on the plastic. There was an arrow pointing to the congregation, then some circles where the bread, wine, two ewers were to be placed. A space had been left for the lectern, but not much. In thinking about it, there was more space devoted to the two ewers, which were not used, or even filled, than for the Minister's notes. You could not really move for fear of knocking something that custom dictated had to be in its exact spot.

We had a Methodist Deacon and their congregation with us for a couple of months while their church was renovated, and I mentioned that I preferred communion at her church, where we could all gather round the table, and there was a bit more spontaneity, although we agreed that isn't always possible due to large congregations and building layout. The last supper was a gathering of friends. I expect the atmosphere may have been a little tense, as everyone knew something was going on. But I am absolutely sure there wasn't a plastic sheet telling those gathered where the plates should go. Perhaps there may even have been food or drink spilled.

When we gather in worship, let's not do it feeling forced to follow traditions for tradition's sake, but instead spontaneously with joy and reverence for the Lord. Perhaps as we move on, we can start our own new traditions. James

VISIT BY GERMAN CHOIR On Sunday 6 August we were joined at morning worship by the Elikuren Chamber Choir, a group of 14 music students from Wunstorf, near Hannover. In recent years they have toured and sung in Egypt, Ghana, Iceland, Canada and Ireland. Their charity concerts are supporting the construction of a children's hospital in Ghana. The choir, under their conductor Christiane Kampe, sang a number of unaccompanied sacred anthems from wonderful works by Bach, Mendelssohn and Schubert. There was a beautiful clarity and depth in how these young adults sang with such conviction and warmth. That in turn inspired strong congregational singing of hymns from the German Church Tradition that had been chosen to celebrate this opportunity to worship together. Before we went through to meet together in the Hall afterwards, we could enjoy a splendid organ voluntary by Buxtehude, played by the young organ scholar who was part of the choir: truly a joyful ending to a special service.
