Young Crown – next steps

I was excited to be able to share with both congregations recently a little of our vision for the re-imagining of our youth group output. We've been thinking and praying about both how delighted we've been with what's gone on through Energize so far and also what God could be calling us to next. As part of this



process, the youth club leaders decided to take the [feels quite bold] step of stopping the youth club for this term; but have been continuing to meet weekly to plan and pray over the next steps for the club.

By taking this time out to plan, we've started to dream, and dream BIG! It's become clear to us that what we're looking to do is not simply implement a list of improvements to the youth club as it stands; but to run something really quite different – a whole new club. The following is just a summary of what we're looking to institute in terms of change; what the aims are and what we might need in order to achieve the desired changes. The decision to stop and re-assess was a difficult one to take, but given the plans we're putting together I hope the right one. The plans right now feel a little ambitious, but I think that is a sign of moving with faith – it doesn't take much faith to run something we know we're easily capable of!!

Aims:

- To run a Christian youth club for P4-7 with strong involvement from young leaders (S1+). The club is primarily for sharing the gospel and uses Luke 2:52 for its mission statement (growing in wisdom, stature and favour with God and people). Thursday evenings from 6:30-8pm, with after-hours for young leaders too.
- Hopefully starting after the Easter holidays.
- For the club to run sustainably requiring a team to work. As I'm 3 years in to a 5 year contract, I'm aware of the need to build structures which will outlast my personal involvement.
- For the club to make stronger connections between the wider church and the young people. The operation of the new club will not work unless there is significant involvement from the wider church!
- To use the club as a vehicle for making stronger links with families.
- To use many spaces within the church to increase familiarity with the building.
- To offer many different activities to suit many tastes.

Changes / dynamics

- Club to run with a sort of 'Holiday Club' style. The idea is that in coming to the club, the young people will be transported not just into a church hall, but into a whole new world – of space exploration or the North Pole; through a time machine to the past or, indeed, the future.
- The club will be called YC inc. The YC stands for lots of things (Young Crown; Youth Club; You Can; Yeah Cool; Your Club, etc)...
- The club night will run roughly as follows:
 - 1. Enter / register (registration / welcomers will be at the Midmills door and then send kids to the upper hall)
 - 2. Group time the upper hall will be divided into year groups where activities will be available upon arrival.
 - 3. Teaching time where everyone is together and there is a Bible story shared through various methods possibly including talk, video clip, drama, etc.
 - 4. Breakout / elements:
 - Games (Upper Hall)
 - Games tables / consoles (Upstairs / the Den)
 - Tuck shop / café includes toasties and some prepared food
 - AV film clips / shows (Sanctuary)
 - Craft / knitting (Lounge)
 - Choir (Lower Hall choir have indicated that if any young people would like to join them, they would be welcome)
 - Parents' Café (Olive Grove) every second week, the Olive Grove is to be opened and available for parents to use whilst their young ones enjoy the club.
 - [One week every month] Parents' night where guardians are invited to stay and share in the activities of the evening activities to be designed around having them involved.

5. Close – where we'll have announcements, team points, a silly video, etc. Done in the Sanctuary (to increase visibility and awareness of the space)

- 6. Pick up will be from the front doors to the Sanctuary so people become more familiar with using these spaces.
- This is obviously an ambitious programme requiring significant investment from people. We're in the territory of journeying in faith because it's too big for us to achieve without God's help!!

Investments required

- Team. Our planning team are: myself, Jude Madeliene, Lynn Forbes, Michael MacAulay, Duncan MacKnight. We need more people to make this work. People who can do welcome / registration; people who can be leaders at group times and people who'll just help out! We're really hoping that the whole church can catch a glimpse of this vision to host this as a strong outreach every week and get on board with it.
- Olive Grove volunteers.
- Prayer a whole church involvement!
- Programme we're looking initially to use SU's Guardians of Ancora material to theme the club over the first term – which is backed by an app (of the same name). The app is a great way to bring the Bible stories and the club experience back into the homes of those attending.
- Equipment: we have a big list of equipment we're looking to bring in to run this club well. For now, we'd be really interested in hearing from anyone who has a **spare TV** or **tablet** around the house!

I hope the flavour we've given you of what we're planning is exciting you – we really think this is a strong project going forwards in not just youth outreach but also to families and community too. We also hope that the way we've put it together gives **you** opportunity to be involved – even if youth work "isn't *your thing.*"

Can we do this? Only with God's help. And yours.

Myself and several others are launching a Youth Club in The Church on Thursdays from 6.30pm to 8pm. This is open to anyone at school in the years Primary 4 to S3. We feel a youth club is a great idea as it will bring youngsters together who perhaps, don't go to church and this will get them familiar with a church environment. They will be able to do lots of practical activities which we shall have in several of the rooms around the church. We shall also be able to build a strong relationship with the youngsters and the church members with this club whilst simultaneously making Crown Church a more advertised place for people to come to on Sundays and during the week. Also, some of the older youngsters will be given responsibilities in the activity sessions to build their leadership skills and make them feel valued. The Olive Grove will also be open (where possible) so parents can also interact with Church Members and thus will help improve the connection with the Church and the wider Community

This has been a successful year thanks to the many speakers we have had and also to the many faithful members who attend so regularly.

How would you cope in a new area? in another country? in another language? surrounded by another culture? Enter HiMRA - Highland Migrant and Refugee Advocacy - based just along from church on the corner of Charles Street/ Ardconnel Terrace. The organisation provides drop in centres in Alness, Dingwall, Inverness and Kinlochleven where our newest Highlanders can access support, information and advice, be directed to specific services or support groups they may need, make friends across cultures and explore activities and events in their new home area. HiMRA also provide an advocacy service for those with specific immigration issues.

Until 16th March, everyone has the opportunity to read many migrant stories in their own words, pictures and objects at the exhibition 'Stories of Movement' at Inverness Museum (lower floor entry hall and learning room). Some of the stories are truly moving - in the heartfelt sense.

There is also a continuing need for local volunteers to help in the two way process of making new Highlanders of all ages become a valued part of our community. Along with the finishing of the building, the Malawians have been busy planting and fertilizing the maize and enjoying a daily nutritious meal throughout the rainy season all due to the wonderful support that the Trust receives through fundraising and donations.

Our annual coffee morning in November more or less finances that feeding programme and for your support every year we give heartfelt thanks. The fertiliser ensures good crops that then ensures food for the other eight months.

At the moment we are getting quotes for furniture for the school building. Another little school, Teanassie Primary School, has fundraised towards that and along with furniture we shall provide new kitchen equipment. This will complete our work at the Primary School and our efforts then will focus on getting our Nursery complex at Chamalaza on par with those at Thandazga and Chittatata .
