This is a guest night when anyone is welcome.

At the end of that week, to celebrate Guild Week and because the Boys' Brigade is one of our chosen projects we are providing a meal for the Crown Church Junior and Company Sections. This is on Friday 9th at 7pm.

On Tuesday 20th we have entered two teams into the annual inter-guild quiz which will be held this year in Trinity Church Hall.

Little Crowns – learning and growing

In aiming to provide a continuing support to our local wee ones (and their grown-ups!), we've spent the last term running toddler groups in both familiar and new formats. We've been pleased that all three of our weekly groups (on Tuesday afternoons; Wednesday and Thursday mornings) have picked up some regular attenders and also drawn interest from new people who

have found the groups either online or by word of mouth. Having set out to start running groups and work on the format, we've certainly been encouraged that people have been attending and enthusiastic about it so far. One attender even took the time to send a lovely recommendation on our Facebook page which said: "A lovely group for parents, babies and toddlers. I have never been to a group before and felt as welcome as I did here."

I'm particularly pleased not just to receive such encouraging feedback, but also to feel that the sense of welcome was what was particularly worth mentioning. In offering these groups, there must be a strong emphasis on welcome – which we would hope leads one day to support, community and growing together. In short, we know we're doing something right when people are engaging with our church and feeling welcome!!




Our offering of a Tuesday afternoon session is very much an experiment. In doing our research we found out that Inverness has very little provision of toddler groups in the afternoons. What we couldn't ascertain is whether that is because there is no demand for it, or simply a need not being met. So we have decided to try to run one and find out. We're still working on it, and specifically the limitations of our busy building at that time of day; but at least we have had people coming along and enjoying the group. It'll be interesting to see how this develops and what it may lead to.

We're looking forward to continuing to learn as we grow this term and beyond. With the future in mind, I'm certainly looking to bring more people on board with helping at these groups and making sure there's a strong welcome to our neighbours and their wee ones. We have enough helpers on the rota to ensure that the church has someone on duty every session – but I'd like to ensure we have two on each session in the future – one based in the kitchen and one on welcome and playtime. I'd be delighted to feel that going forward we can throw more support at these groups and the people who come along to them. Could this be the opportunity in mission you've been looking for? Let me know! As ever, keep praying!



New Moderator-Designate

The new Moderator-Designate once appeared as an extra in a Monty Python film! Rev Colin Sinclair, minister of Palmerston Place Church in Edinburgh for more than 20 years, is expected to take over the year-long role of Moderator at the General Assembly next May.

"I have thoroughly enjoyed being a parish minister and despite the challenges we face I believe the Christian faith is still relevant to Scotland."

Mr Sinclair was an economics student at Stirling University when he took a holi-



day job as a film extra playing a Roman soldier in the 1975 film Monty Python and the Holy Grail, which caused some controversy among church-goers at the time.

Growing up in Glasgow, he had first become interested in the Christian faith by accident as he tried to escape getting into trouble at school. A prefect at Glasgow Academy had seen

him taking the wrong staircase, so he dodged into a darkened room, only to find a video being shown about a Scripture Union camp.

"I enjoyed the film, thought the activities looked great and I felt I could put up with the 'religious stuff'," he said. "I did love the camp and had great fun, and I liked the leaders. But to my surprise I also enjoyed the meetings with their lively singing and straightforward message about Jesus Christ. So started an exciting adventure of faith that has lasted over 50 years."

When the idea of being a minister was first suggested he dismissed it. "I thought ministry was about having tea with old ladies, so as I wasn't interested in either tea or old ladies I thought it wasn't for me."


During his time at university he changed his mind and was accepted to train for the Church of Scotland ministry at New College in Edinburgh. Before he started his studies, however, he was approached by Scripture Union and asked if he would consider going to Zambia as a training officer in an exchange that would allow two Zambian students to study in the UK. He decided it was an offer he could not refuse.

The job, which involved travelling around Zambia, living out of his car and speaking at schools, churches, hospitals and colleges, ended up lasting three years. "Those three years changed my life," said Mr Sinclair. "Being away from everything familiar I was able to sort out which parts of my faith were mine, and which were not."


