Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church:

With the relaxation of the Government's lockdown restrictions, we can once more worship together as the congregation of the Crown Church. So, I am delighted to let you know that weekly public services will begin again on **Sunday 9 August at 9:30am (in the Lower Hall) and 11 am (in the Church Sanctuary).**

I look forward to seeing some of you then, although I realise that sadly it will not be possible for everybody to come. The virus is still with us although far less prevalent than previously. Government advice remains that those who are **'extremely vulnerable'** and therefore shielding, should not come to church, and those who are **'vulnerable'**, which includes everyone



over 70 and those suffering from various medical conditions, should think very carefully about your own situation and risks before coming. You should not, of course, come to church if you are unwell.

Just as in shops, we need to make changes in the way we do things to keep us all safe and to comply with the Government's requirements.

We must at all times observe the 2 metre rule and good hand hygiene.

For both services, you will be met by a member of a Welcome Team but of course we cannot shake hands.

As you enter you will be asked to record your name and a phone number to comply



with the

Government's *test and protect* scheme.

The information will be used only for this purpose. Please don't think you **have** to come! I appreciate that a number of you will be happier to continue watching the service from home for just now. Please wear a *face covering,* and use the *hand sanitiser* which will be available. *Ushers will show you to seats*, following a pattern that is designed to minimise risk of compromising the 2 metre rule.

For the 9:30am service, please enter by the door beside the minister's parking spot on Midmills Road, which has an accessibility ramp. Seats will be set around tables for family / household groups.

For the 11am service, please enter by either the Midmills Door or the Garden Door. Dasabled access is available at the Garden Door.

In both cases, at the end of the service, you must follow the guidance that will be given to you, to exit safely.

Other things you need to know:-

We are not permitted to have congregational singing.

The toilets will not be available, except in emergency.

We cannot meet for tea/coffee after the service.

Carparking will not be available in the school car park.

I do hope that it will not be long before these restrictions can be removed or reduced, but in the meantime, let us give thanks for some movement in the right direction.

I have, of course, continued to broadcast services throughout the lockdown. To comply with government requirements, I have had to be alone in the church, accompanied only by Louis our organist. I have been heartened by the many messages of support I have received and the consistently high numbers continuing to 'gather' week by week online, but it will be a joy to have company again in the house of the Lord as we worship.

We will continue to live stream the services for the benefit of those who are unable to attend. In view of the data protection regulations, the broadcast will not show the congregation.

Even in difficult circumstances, the Apostle Paul exhorts us to, "Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, rejoice." (Philippians 4:4)

Crown 20/20 Group Update

"Crown Church aims to invest in a major upgrade of our church buildings to provide a warm and welcoming home for worship, equip us with modern and accessible facilities to support Christian outreach into our community and to help our church meet the needs of that community."

Dear Members of the Congregation

As we move towards an easing of the Covid-19 restrictions and a return to communal worship, a clearer picture is emerging of the timescale for the major changes that are planned for our church building.

The Highland Council programme for carrying out the work to convert our Lower Hall into two nursery classrooms for Crown Primary School shows that they aim to start construction in the final two weeks of 2020.

This will include the installation of a lift to provide access to the Upper Hall, where we have plans for a major upgrade, improving the insulation, extending and refurbishing the toilets, fitting out the kitchen and providing greater storage capacity for church user groups.

Meantime the Highland Council are pursuing surveys and permissions, and their kitchen designer has visited to discuss with us prior to drawing her plans for the kitchen upgrade.

One urgent issue that has been identified is the need to create space for the many users of our facilities during the major construction works in the halls. We had hoped to have access to accommodation at Crown Primary School but due to the Covid-19 restrictions we cannot expect this to be automatically possible now. A solution is therefore urgently needed and the Crown 20/20 Group is recommending a pragmatic way forward. We have asked the Kirk Session to support Crown 20/20 to bring forward a detailed plan and costings for the removal of pews from downstairs in the sanctuary in advance of the Council works beginning, to create the space

required for all our users 24/7, and this support has been given.

We will keep everyone updated with progress in this regard.

God uses Crown Church and an old Subaru

It has been a privilege to be able to run an emergency supply hub which has the versatility to meet many needs. We have seen churches and partner organisations better able to support those in need in their communities going forward through follow up. In a typical week my 2004 Subaru Outback takes roughly 10 to 15 crates of donated supplies from Tesco to stock up every Monday since mid-March. This has then gone out to churches and from there on to foodbanks, individuals, charities and food projects all over the presbytery. More supplies are now going out of the door than a couple of months ago – which will be in part due to more people knowing about what help we can offer, but also I think indicates an increase in need.



In March Crown Church set up a community helpline and sent flyers to 1600 households letting them know we could help. God has placed us in the community to love our neighbours and we've been able to do so in a very tangible way throughout the last few months; in many cases it has been positive contact with our neighbours that we've not had previously. Furthermore, we've delivered emergency supplies to people who have been referred through social services and HighLife Highland adult education services. We delivered supplies to people who were sadly awaiting access to Universal Credit. It isn't just the fact that we can supply food, toiletries and other essentials; but also that they know we're here, willing and able to help in the hour of need – that makes all the difference. A local group has started a Crown Community larder. It has been a privilege to work with them as we help each other in providing care for our community.



We've also benefitted from looking to engage with worship services online. We've found ways to connect most regular congregants (and a good number of new ones!) with our online broadcast services, and meet by Zoom for post-church coffee which has perhaps led to more conversation than would have happened before lockdown! It's been eye-opening to see what we had previously dismissed (because it was difficult) in terms of online services is actually quite

possible. The next question for us should not be "when can we get *back to normal?"* God is calling us into new and better, He always has been. There have been so many blessings in loving our community during lockdown and a strengthening in the resolve of the church to prioritise meeting together. We're already on a journey towards a redevelopment of our buildings in search of how God is calling us to better love our community and renew our worship, and I believe He is inspiring much thought and prayerful reflection amongst the church during this period.
