Therefore if you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any common sharing in the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others.

In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus.

Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church,

The English author, scholar and clergyman John Donne has become famous across nearly 400 years, mostly thanks to a single stanza from which we can all quote the start and the end: "*No man is an island, entire of itself*," and "*ask not for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee*".

Most of us might not even know that there are other, equally profound words in between these two oft-quote phrases, let alone that this in turn is part of a much larger work,



Meditation 17, in a book of 23 "*Devotions Upon Emergent Occasions*," written during a period of severe illness which the author clearly believed would be the end of him.

In the days before the internet or even newspapers, ringing the church bell was a way of communicating to the parish that something significant had happened, with a long, slow, repeated, single ring, indicating that someone had died. But in Meditation 17, Donne also refers to the tolling of a bell to call people to prayer in the morning and again in the evening.

For him, suffering was itself occasion for prayer and for an increase in devotion to God, even suffering unto death, such that, in the face of death, he ended this Meditation by talking about "making my recourse to my God, who is our only security".

It seems to me as if the struggles of the last few months, wherein a virus barely visible under a microscope has highlighted the fragility of our 'way of life' as much as the fragility of life itself, could be heard like a bell tolling. Perhaps it is calling us out of the lethargy of comfortable repose for morning prayers; perhaps it is calling us to evening prayers in the twilight days of 'how things have always been'. It's hard to tell while we are in the midst of it, like the parishioners who heard the church bell ringing long and slow and asked, "Who has died?" Donne warned them, perhaps it is you.

The good news is that Donne recovered, just as I am confident that so much of the life that we cherish will recover, but perhaps now is the time to reflect, as he did, on the fragility of all that we take for granted and the reality of our mortality, and ask ourselves, "At the end of the day, when the bell tolls, what really matters?" And the good news!

I write to let you know that one of our own, Judith Macleod, has been accepted as a candidate for full-time ordained ministry in the Church of Scotland. The final step of the approval process was completed last month when the Presbytery of Inverness approved her candidature and a training placement at St Columba's in Inverness.

Judith has said that her journey to this point began some time ago with a growing sense of God's call on her life. But let her tell the story in her own words:

The process for candidates to be approved has changed in the last couple of years. It begins with a discernment conversation with a member of the team from 121 George Street. From that conversation the decision is made as to whether or not an applicant will enter into the discernment process . This involves a Discernment Placement at a different church, exploring the role of ministry and what the role entails, along with time spent in discussion with the Minister to discern the call. The Presbytery also appoint an Assessor, who meets with you a few of times throughout the placement. The Discernment Placement, which in my case was 3 months long (although it can take up to 6 months), was followed by a "Local Review". By this time lockdown had begun so this interview, which takes place with the Minister supervising the placement, the Presbytery Assessor and a National Church Assessor, took place on Zoom.

The decision of this meeting was that I should proceed to a National Assessment Conference. Usually these conferences gather together the applicants from a number of parts of the country for an overnight stay, with a series of interviews and tasks to assess your suitability for ministry. This was initially booked for the start of May, but as time went on it became obvious that it could not happen in the usual way. So this step of the process also took place over the internet in mid-June. It was a long day of I nterviews, with tasks to prepare in advance and to complete between the interviews. The outcome of this conference is that I was approved to proceed to training as a candidate for full time ministry of word and sacrament.

Training involves academic study as well as a series of placements at other churches. So I have begun my training with a weekend National Conference for Candidates, online instead of a weekend in St Andrews, where I met the other people who are in training for the ministry. I have just started academic study at University of the Highlands and Islands, Highland Theological College, which this year is fully online due to the pandemic. My first placement will be with St Columba's new charge in Inverness.

I'm sure you will join me in wishing Judith God's richest blessings throughout all of the challenges that still lie between now and ordination, and assuring her of our full support and every possible assistance that we can provide.

Crown 20/20 Group Update

"Crown Church aims to invest in a major upgrade of our church buildings to provide a warm and welcoming home for worship, equip us with modern and accessible facilities to support Christian outreach into our community and to help our church meet the needs of that community."

Dear Members of the Congregation

We are delighted to let you know that all systems are go for work to commence on the major refurbishment of the Upper Hall on 13th October. All the church permissions have been granted and the Upper Hall has been cleared, ready for contractors I&K Ferguson to move on site. Our hope is that the work can be completed ahead of The



Highland Council commencing work at the end of this year or early next year on the conversion of the Lower Hall into a pre-school facility for Crown Primary School. Crown 20/20 are grateful that the proposed timetable will mean very few people will be inconvenienced while the upper hall is being refurbished.

The upgrade of the Upper Hall will see removal of the stage to provide more storage and better use of the space as well as a new kitchen, improved toilet facilities with the addition of a shower, improved insulation and a décor makeover. It will be the first stage in making our premises fit for use in the 21st century - part of

our response to the recognition by the Church nationally that such immediate action will underpin the revitalisation and strengthening of the work of the church.

How are we paying for the upgrade? Mainly we have received funding from church reserves. Unfortunately our application to the Ferguson Bequest was not granted. A new application has been made to Inverness Common Good Fund. But to be successful with our applications we must demonstrate the support of the congregation, through giving. Hopefully everyone received a letter signed by our Minister, Douglas Robertson, Crown 2020 Chair Jimmy Gray and Head of Fund-raising Alan Nelson inviting you to consider making a donation, large or small, to the costs of not only the Upper Hall upgrade but other planned improvements to the church building.

This includes other areas of the church building and a remodelling of the Sanctuary to make better use of the space and provide a more modern and welcoming facility at the heart of our Crown community. These developments of course will be a few years in the planning and the fund raising, and we expect by then to be in a happier position and able to hold congregational meetings to discuss them. The early responses to the appeal letter have been hugely encouraging and we are immensely grateful. We have a long way to go to meet the contribution needed to meet our aspirations, but the amount of around £12,000 announced by our Minister on Sunday has at the time of writing now gone up to £18,694. These amounts include the Gift Aid which will be recouped. We welcome all donations, large and small - every penny counts We ask you to give it your prayerful consideration.

We hope this update assures you that despite the challenges of Covid-19, very real progress is being made by the Crown 20/20 in realising our goals as set out at the top of the message.

These are both opportunities we're exploring over the coming months which could be as exciting as they are surprising!

How can we be good news for toddlers when we can run toddler groups? Well, lockdown won't last forever – but when it is over, we'll have a brand new hall and have prepared the best version of toddler groups we've ever put on – with revised and improved formats, spaces and beautiful new equipment.

How can we share the gospel at home when we can't visit? We're working on putting some top quality resources online for families to explore together. Our hope is that by advent, there will be a new set of resources available for families to use and celebrate together – even if this is no ordinary Christmas season.

God is still good and so we still have good news to tell; praise Him for these opportunities we'd never have had in 'ordinary' times!

But in all of it, let us call to mind that there is One who acknowledges these realities and in the face of them, promises 'never to leave us nor forsake us' (Hebrews 13:5) Shall we then 'trust in the Lord for help and so find our strength renewed?' In so doing might we discover again that those who do so 'will rise up on wings as eagles, that they will run and not get weary, walk and not faint.' (Isaiah 40:31) For both Church and the country, I assure you of my continuing prayers.

Granton Goes Greener now provides a clothes swap, "Share 'n' wear" and redistributes surplus food from <u>FareShare</u>. This inspiring climate project has also been doing lots of outreach like family fun days, Christmas fayres, sewing classes, mental health support groups and more. In recent months Granton Goes Greener has also adapted well to the challenges presented by COVID-19.


