From the Minister

Dear members and friends of Crown Church,

Prayer was important to Jesus. Luke records that, "Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." (5:16)

The words of Jesus' prayers are not always recorded. What seems to have been important for the Gospel writers, is often just the simple fact that he made the effort and took the time, to keep himself centred in the mind and will of his Father in heaven.



Some of Jesus' prayers are of course recorded, most famously "The Lord's Prayer". These prayers have formed the basis of a series of Bible studies for the season of Lent. As I write, I'm preparing for a study based on the brief prayer of Jesus in John 12:28, "Father, glorify your name", though in some sense the context of the prayer is as important as the content.

Jesus was contemplating the final, brutal part of his ministry of service to the purposes of God. He says openly that his soul is troubled, and he foreshadows the later prayer, in the Garden of Gethsemane, where he might even wish that there was some other way to accomplish God's salvation, yet he submits wholly and willingly to God's will. (Mark 14:36)

In his anguish, he prays only that the name of God will be glorified. And God responds in a voice that was heard for the benefit of those who were with Jesus, "I have glorified it, and will glorify it again." Presumably in the first part he was referring to the life and teaching of Jesus, and in the latter part to the resurrection – which can only be achieved through the crucifixion.

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Herein lies the whole mystery of Easter, the moment of both judgement and salvation, the sins of our humanity carried to the cross by the sinless Son of God and forgiven. None of this made sense to the disciples who were listening, and to be honest there are many aspect of it that still don't make sense to us, even after 2000 years of theology and faith being studied and explained!

Yet we do know that above all, God will be glorified, and the light of his love, grace, mercy and forgiveness will shine through those who follow Jesus.

"Whoever walks in the dark," said Jesus, "does not know where they are going. Believe in the light while you have the light, so that you may become children of light." (John 12:35-36)

Update from Crown 20/20 Group

"Crown Church aims to invest in a major upgrade of our church buildings to provide a warm and welcoming home for worship, equip us with modern and accessible Facilities to support Christian outreach into our community and to help our church meet the needs of that community."

Dear Members of the Congregation,

Really positive progress continues to be made on the refurbishment of the Upper Hall as well as the installation of our new lift and the refit of our kitchens in the Lower and Upper Hall areas.

We have incorporated in the newsletter the latest images of the Upper Hall, the lift and the kitchen lay-outs to give you a better understanding of developments.

Another big issue for us is the removal of a significant quantity of asbestos insulation material, mainly from the basement, and we are indebted to The Highland Council for identifying and paying for a specialist to carry out this vital work.

The Council are carrying out the work ahead of converting the Lower Hall into a nursery unit for Crown Primary School. The Council have advised us that their contractor, Morrison Construction, hopes to start work in the Lower Hall on Monday 26 April and complete the contract by 6 August. We are confident that most of the work being carried out in the Upper Hall will be completed by the time the Council moves in.

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The Upper Hall is the focus of much of the current building activity at the church and contractors I&F Ferguson are making good progress on the refit to give us even better facilities and greater storage.

So to the images I mentioned at the start of this update.

The Upper Hall is taking shape as this photo illustrates.

The 8-person Innovation Lift is produced by Scandanavia AB, whose mission statement is: "We can, we do and we do it smarter". A photo is attached. I hope you agree it looks impressive.

Recollection of a Pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela

I have been looking through old papers recently and came across the following:

Excerpt from my diary of 22nd April 2005 during a pilgrimage in Northern Spain to Santiago de Compostela

"It was late afternoon when Donald, Ken and I arrived in the little hilltop town of Astorga. Footsore and tired, we



threw our rucksacks down by the fountain in the town square and rested.

We made friends with an English gentleman by the name of Jim who told us that he had had to give up his pilgrimage after twisting his ankle and spraining the tendons in his leg. Jim told us how his companions had continued on their journey while he rested his leg and made plans to return to England.

Without hesitation, Donald asked Jim if he would like us to pray over him for the healing of his leg to which he agreed so we sat Jim down on the steps by the fountain while we both placed our hands on him and prayed in the name of Jesus that his leg be healed.

Imagine my astonishment when, standing with one hand on Jim's shoulder and the other hand raised to heaven calling on the Holy Spirit, a pure white dove with lovely little red eyes came out of a clear blue sky and alighted on the edge of the fountain not six feet away and facing us. Looking at Jim, then at Donald and myself, the dove turned around and took a drink from the fountain, rose up and was last seen disappearing over the rooftops.

If this was not a sign from God, I don't know what is. I am certain that all will be well with Jim.


Thanks be to God."

The footnote to this recollection is that, three years later, the wife of my companion Donald sent me a cutting from a Christian newsletter with an article by Jim which told of his injury on his pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela and of two pilgrims asking for his healing while he was resting at the fountain. The article went on to say that, when he woke the following morning, his pain had gone and that he had set of once more on his pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela.

Jim's spirits had been so lifted, that within two days he caught up with his companions and that they all continued their journey together to their destination in Santiago de Compostela. Jim ended his article by praising God for His goodness.

You can imagine my reaction on reading this!


We have received an email from the Community and Events Officer at CrossReach inviting us to get take part in their 'CrossReach Prayer Share' campaign.
