THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

I'm looking forward to Easter. Christmas is a bit too busy with all the external pressures that are placed on us. But Easter is special and often a bit quieter. What do we celebrate at Christmas? A birth. Yes, it's the birth of our saviour, Jesus, but anyone can be born. We all have. But at Easter we celebrate that Jesus didn't just die, but instead defeated death and rose again. And he's waiting there for us all, on the other side to welcome us.

However my busiest Easter took place before I was a Minister. I was finishing my training in 2015 and the church I was working with put on an event for the schools called The Easter Code. It was a half day event which took place in one of our church halls. We set up a village out of garden gazebos, with each gazebo house representing a different event in the Easter Story. Of course, when you have set that sort of event up once, it's just as easy to have a second class later in the day. And when that was done, most of the set was moved to the church where my wife was training, and we did the same thing again three times. Five loads of the Easter story in three days. I didn't know whether I was coming or going at the end of it.

Yet what got me each time was the enthusiasm from the pupils. For many, this was the first time anyone had truly dug into the Easter story and explained it to them, from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. They asked the difficult questions and seriously kept all of us on our toes.

So this year, I'd encourage you to explain the Easter story to the young, and not so young folks in your lives. Easter is for most just a holiday, with chocolate eggs for the children. Schools do not think of putting on Easter plays. Even secular schools put on nativity plays. So this is the chance for you to explain the significance of Easter, and hopefully they too will ask you the difficult questions. Remember, if someone is old enough to ask a question, they deserve an age appropriate answer.

Easter is more than just the chocolate holiday. Easter is truly when we can celebrate the sacrifice of Jesus. And the knowledge that he is waiting for us. So enjoy the chocolate, and happy Easter.

UNION WITH CROWN CHURCH

I thought it might be helpful to bring everyone up to date with where we are in relation to the proposed union with Crown Church. Both Kirk Sessions held a joint meeting at Crown Church on 1 March and discussed the Basis of Union. A copy of the draft was in our last newsletter.

Presbytery have given us guidance to the effect that we do need to find a new name for the united church and have advised it would be best to avoid the existing names or using combinations of them. The congregations were given the opportunity to suggest suitable names, and in the end over 50 names have been put forward. The two Kirk Sessions were given a copy of the list of names as a voting paper, and by the time you read this I will have met with Bob Forrest, Session Clerk at Crown Church to count the votes, as we have been tasked with doing so and identifying the most popular name. Thereafter both Kirk Sessions need to meet, independently, to agree the Basis of Union, including the new name.

Once this has been done, both churches then require to hold a congregational meeting where the terms of the Draft Basis of Union (including the new name) are put to the congregations for approval. As and when such a proposal is forthcoming, the Presbytery will be advised and steps will then be taken to implement the union.

OTHER NEWS

GAMBIA PAEDIATRIC CARDIAC SERVICE INITIATIVE IN ASSOCIATION WITH OHSS CHURCH. Dr Deborah Shanks, my former Paediatric colleague involved me into this visionary project and OHSS Church has provided generous funding. I am Dr Reddeppa Thimmarayanagari, Consultant Paediatrician who has been working at Raigmore Hospital, Inverness for 23 years. I always had a passion to work with disadvantaged communities. The Gambia is a small and poor country in Africa and has no access to Paediatric cardiac services in Government hospitals. A significant number of children with heart conditions are undiagnosed and have no access to proper management leading to early death and suffering for the child and family. The total cost of our first visit was around £4000 and Old High St Stephen's kindly provided £2000 towards this. The aim is to teach a local Paediatrician and team to do ECHOs (cardiac scanner) and ECGs with a view to offering diagnostic services to Paediatric cardiac cases in the Gambia.

Work undertaken during 2022 The necessary equipment (ECHO (one) and ECG machines (three) have already been sent and the first visit by myself and an accredited Sonologist has taken place. It was well received by the Management of the Hospital and during this visit we managed to see 76 cardiac patients. We have also provided basic Cardiac scan skill locally.

Current Status Having been on our first visit to Gambia during December 2022, we identified the need for at least one more ECHO machine and at least two ECHO technicians on the next trip in addition to myself. With this, one ECHO machine can be used for service delivery and another machine for training. This will enhance training opportunities. An ECHO machine has been identified and is ready for shipping and there are two volunteer ECHO technicians willing to give their valuable time in supporting this cause. We hope to visit this year and also next year.



We will also hopefully establish a telelink to offer necessary support to the local team between visits. We therefore would very much appreciate if possible further funding to support our visits to Banjul, Gambia from OHSS Church.

The Archie Child Bereavement Service is a relatively new service to the Highlands, supporting bereaved children and young people. We have already been supporting

bereaved children and families through our telephone service, our free book gifting service, and our mentoring service where we give advice and guidance practitioners and professionals to appropriately support bereaved children. Another part of services is our Responder Visits service, where a trained volunteer visit families to provide appropriate grief support and guidance, including some direct work with children or young people involved.

This service is unique to the Highlands as there are no other charities or organisations who offer this type of support to bereaved children, nor offer this volunteering opportunity. We train all our volunteers with a 6 part series as well as providing resources and books for you to use for the children and families. We match volunteers with families in your own community, so we would not expect excessive travel. You will be working as part of a fantastic team who are dedicated to their role of providing support, advice and we know that some families find peace, solace and comfort in religious organisations following a bereavement . With that said we would be very appreciative if you could share this volunteering opportunity with your congregation, giving further support to children and families you already may be supporting and help families in your community who are not yet receiving any help. We cannot provide this service without the time, effort and commitment of our amazing volunteers who will add value to the Responder Visit service we provide and are significant members in the Archie Foundation.
