From the Minister

Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church,

I am writing this on the afternoon of Pentecost Sunday, sometimes thought of as the birthday of the Christian church. I am also writing in the shadow of two significant decisions taken recently, one by our brothers and sisters in Christ at Old High St Stephens Church and the other by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.



I used the analogy of wind in church this morning to speak of the Holy Spirit. You can't see it, but you can see, or hear, or feel its effects. It has just struck me that wind is also unpredictable. Weather forecasters do an amazing job these days, but still, the wind can gust suddenly or die down suddenly, it can change direction, it can push into places we thought were sheltered and leave untouched something we worried might be vulnerable.

In John's Gospel chapter 3, Jesus speaks about the Holy Spirit as the agent of God's salvation, you must be born again, but not of the flesh this time, of the Holy Spirit. And then he says, "The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit."

In the church of Jesus Christ, inspired (which means "breathed into") by his Holy Spirit, sometimes we can be led off in unexpected directions. Sometimes our plans will seem to be blown away, and sometimes opportunities will surprise us. Sometimes we might feel like a ship becalmed, making no progress as if the wind has deserted us, while at other times the rate of change can make us feel overwhelmed, as if it has a life of its own which we cannot control. Which is exactly the point. The Holy Spirit does have a life of his own and we are not in control.

Only the Spirit of God can revive the church with grace and courage, so let us pray for the Spirit of God to inspire the Church of Scotland, all churches in Inverness, and Crown Church. And then let's see what he has in store for us! Blessings,

Union with Old High St Stephens An Update

Matters have moved on since my article in the April newsletter but not in the way that we anticipated.

The congregational vote was taken at Crown church on Sunday 14th May and there was an overwhelming majority in favour of the union. The only issues raised related to the name which had been chosen by the 2 Kirk Sessions.

However, the vote at Old High St Stephens, which was taken on the same Sunday, went the other way and the congregation voted quite decisively to reject the union.

This begs the question, "What happens next"?

Our minister, the Reverend Douglas Robertson, has spoken both to the Presbytery clerk and the convenor of the Presbytery's mission plan implementation team and, for the moment, no one is clear what effect this decision will have in either the short or longer term. The matter is complicated by the fact that the present mission plan includes proposed parish boundary changes which affect several other neighbouring churches.

All I am really able to say at the moment is that the Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Team will meet in June to discuss the situation and it is anticipated that they will make a recommendation to the Presbytery which meets on June 27th.

I would hope that the position will become clearer after the Presbytery meeting and, when I know the outcome of that meeting, I will put a note under the "Latest News" section in our own website.

On a more positive note, there has been recent agreement that the joint ventures which Crown church has been undertaking along with the members of Old High St Stephens should continue since there appears no good reason why we should not continue to work closely with our fellow Christians just along the road.

NINE PRESBYTERIES BECOME ONE

The Church of Scotland in the Highlands and Hebrides

It was my privilege to represent nine Presbyteries at this year's General Assembly - I don't think that's ever happened before! We were united in seeking to become one, as part of the Kirk's major restructuring. Over three years of work brought us to this significant moment.

The Assembly listened, agreed, and passed an Act – so **Clèir Eilean Ì** will come into being on 1st January 2024. It means, literally, "The Presbytery of the Isle of Iona," and the vision behind this goes back to the time of St. Columba and his missionaries, whose call was to spread the new gospel of Jesus to all of Scotland. The nine Presbyteries coming together are Abernethy, Argyll, Caithness, Inverness, Lochaber, Lochcarron/Skye, Ross, Sutherland, and Uist; together, they cover over 40% of Scotland's landmass – and there is no part of that area untouched by these early missionaries. Hence the name.

This is ultimately about *mission* – and how we can do it more effectively together in the future. So there will be a full-time clerk, professional resources to help with finance, buildings, etc, freeing up ministers, elders, deacons and others to refocus on mission. As I said to the General Assembly:

"Welcome to Scotland's biggest Presbytery. Covering countless square miles of loch, glens, islands and mountains, together with city, suburban and university communities, cutting edge technology and new expressions of Church meet traditional Christian life in mission and ministry shaped for the 21st century."

It's the final – and by far the biggest – change in our national Presbytery structure ever. Three years ago, there were 43 Presbyteries within Scotland, most with part-time and volunteer staff, trying to do all the things presbyteries have traditionally done, and exhausting everyone in the process.

By January, there will be nine; each one seeking to enable mission by supporting our new ministry clusters with professional support where needed, taking administrative burdens away from overstretched volunteers, and focusing on Mission.

There will be far fewer meetings – and most of these will be online, or hybrid, like the General Assembly itself – and the emphasis will be on resourcing and developing local mission and ministry, based firmly on the Mission Plans developed over the last two years by each of the Presbyteries.

As I said to the Assembly: "This Presbytery will be a uniquely interesting place in which to carry forward ministry and mission for Christ... its proposed Mission Cluster patterns, its central resourcing to empower local and regional ministry and mission, its necessary online and hybrid meeting processes, all contribute to a challenging future for us. But this is now our vision and calling."

Food For Thought

The Presiding Officer (Alison Johnstone): Good afternoon. The first item of business is time for reflection, and our leader today is the Rev Kenneth MacKenzie, minister of the parish of Braemar and Crathie, and domestic chaplain to His Majesty the King.

The Rev Kenneth I MacKenzie (Braemar and Crathie Parish Church and Domestic Chaplain to His Majesty the King):

Presiding Officer, members of the Scottish Parliament, good afternoon. In a place where rhetoric matters, let me crave your indulgence by asking a question that is not as rhetorical, nor as grammatically correct, as some might prefer.

What does it feel like to be prayed for?

I ask that of you who have been elected to the Scottish Parliament, because even in this month of May, in the year of our Lord 2023, when another group of nationwide representatives will assemble, as you first did, in a historic hall just up this street, I cannot think of another Scottish body that will be more often the subject of prayer than this honourable house.

What does it feel like to be prayed for?

This is not the first time that I have asked that question, but being by nature and nurture a Highlander, and still identifying as Invernessian, the last time I dropped that question, I reverted to the Queen's English. In fact, in true Highland style, I did not so much drop the question as drop the question mark.

Two weeks ago, at the door of Crathie kirk, I took the liberty of assuring one of our congregants that on the day of his upcoming coronation he would almost certainly be the most prayed-for person in all of Christendom. Like his mother before him, he seemed rather moved by such a declaration.

In his much-remarked-upon book "Religion for Atheists: A non-believer's guide to the uses of religion", Alain de Botton reflects on the fact that in every flourishing culture and society there has always been room for symbolism and ceremony. He, naturally enough, bemoans the fact that in nearly all instances, ceremony and symbolism seem so intrinsically bound to faith and belief. I —some might suggest naturally enough—am not at all surprised that that should be the case. As we preachers and parliamentarians know only too well, there are times when words—ordinary words—are not enough.

In times of trouble or triumph, and on the occasion of appointment or disappointment, words matter, but they are not enough. It is in part through ceremony and symbolism, and in part through prayer, that we mere mortals allow room for mystery and for meaning. Blessed are those who know what it is to be kept in the prayers of a nation.




