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THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

As November rolls round, thoughts often go to remembrance. This year it is 99 years since the start of what was called the war to end all wars. If only it had lived up to its name. World War I was one of the deadliest wars in history, and resulted in an estimated 9 million soldiers dead and 23 million wounded, while 5 million civilians died due to military action, hunger and disease. Millions more died as a result of genocide, and the devastation of the war heavily contributed to the 1918 Spanish flu pandemic. The instability after the war certainly would lay the conditions which would give rise to the second world war some years later.

I have always been a bit of an aviation geek, which means I fit right in with my role as chaplain to the Air Cadets. However I am very much aware that many of the things we take for granted in modern aviation have only came about through research that was done in order to aid military aviation. Pressurised cabins, radar, and many other technologies can all trace their origin back to development for military, rather than civil applications. Even our own airport at Inverness, whose runway I ran just a couple of months ago, originated as RAF Dalcross, which was opened in 1940 and which housed a number of training squadrons.

More recently, on a visit to the air museum at Elvington which I visited while down for the Yorkshire Marathon (more on that later), I was struck by the beauty of the aircraft which were designed for the sole purpose of carrying nuclear weapons. And the research that would give rise to the atomic bomb would ultimately bring about nuclear power, and the ability to make nuclear isotopes used in medicine. I have to ask, how well developed would aviation and nuclear medicine (and a whole host of other technologies) be without the investment that was brought about through conflict?

Isaiah 2:4 states

He will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks.

Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.

It is a wonderful goal to strive for, however with conflict raging in the Middle East and Ukraine, as well as the dozens of other conflicts raging throughout the world, the hope for the swords being turned into ploughshares seems further away than ever. However it is our duty to strive for peace on earth, knowing that at some day, we will all go to the Lords temple where there will be peace.

And I hope that, as you reflect on Remembrance Sunday, you will join me in wishing that the weapons of war will take their final place in the museums of the world.

JAMES' YORKSHIRE MARATHON You will no doubt have noticed from my absence the other week that I was off on another marathon adventure, this time to York, a city that I know and love very well. This was my third marathon, and while I promised this would be my last, our running group have all expressed a desire to do another.

This year I was running in aid of the Scottish Association for Mental Health. SAMH does fantastic work throughout the country, and it's a charity I've supported for a long time. It's as important to look after our mental health as it is our physical.

Mental health problems can affect the way you think, feel and behave. Some mental health problems are described using words that are in everyday use, for example, 'depression' and 'anxiety'. This can make them seem easier to understand, but can also mean people underestimate how serious they can be.

SAMH operates over 70 services in communities across Scotland, providing mental health social care support, addictions and employment services, among others.

At time of writing, I've raised over £1,600 for SAMH, and I'd like to thank all of you who have donated and wished me well in the run up to this adventure.
