From the Minister

Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church,

As I write, Easter is finished for another year. But it really isn't, is it? A bit like puppies and Christmas, we need to restate and reemphasise that the Resurrection is not just for Easter. Every Sunday is Resurrection Sunday.

During my probationary year (1990-91) I remember speaking to the late Rev Stewart Jeffries, who was my supervising minister in the parish of Tillydrone in Aberdeen, about choosing hymns for the weekly service of worship. He said that ideally there should be at least one Christmas and one Easter hymn in every service,



every week – our Christian faith is perpetually about the Incarnation and the Resurrection every week, every day, all the time.

Church services don't always work out like that, of course, and even Stewart admitted that it was a principle to keep in mind though it was not always practical to implement. There are many wonderful hymns that we want to include in the broad scope of our worship repertoire, covering many parts of the life of Jesus and the rich and varied life of his church, exclaiming the wonder and majesty of God, Father Son and Holy Spirit, and expressing our praise and adoration, confession and supplication, love and devotion to a wonderful Saviour.

Yet, somewhat more than 30 years later, I reflect on that early advice frequently, and some of you may even have heard me mention it.

Maybe someday I'll have the courage to start an Easter service with "Once in Royal David's City", or close a Christmas service with "Thine be the Glory", but for the moment I just ask you to reflect on the fullness of God's glory and grace in Jesus Christ. The story began long before the birth, with God's plan of salvation since the very beginning of the world, and it doesn't end with the resurrection either, it goes on, every day, in the hearts of believers who marvel at God's love and in the hearts of people who discover it for the first time.

But the plan came to fruition in that special life that we celebrate at Christmas and Easter and every day in between.

May God bless you this perpetual Easter day!

An Easter Reflection from our Moderator, Rev Doug McRoberts



CRUCIFIED, RISEN... AND DEEPLY, DEEPLY PERSONAL...

Because she took time at the tomb, Mary Magdalene experienced the power of God in ways the other disciples missed.

The tomb was empty! She rushed back to tell the other disciples. Peter and John, as ever, were the most competitive in the race to see for themselves... and John can't resist telling us he got there first. But it was Peter, seconds later, who ran past him right into the rock tomb, and saw the emptiness for himself.

Then, John says, "The disciples went back to their homes..." Bewildered. Not knowing what to think. To a locked upper room. And **there's** the explanation. They were terrified! For all they knew either the Romans or the Jewish leaders had removed the body to further humiliate Jesus and his followers.



But Mary stayed...

Just as mystified as Peter and John. Probably just as afraid, confused, and grief-stricken. But they left and she stayed. And so, she experienced something that no one else did. She must have spoken of this precious moment, years later, to John. So we know that she was crying – so hard she couldn't actually see Jesus, at first, through the tears. We shouldn't miss *the mourning*.

Of course, Peter and John had looked into the empty tomb. But, John says, "*They still did not understand from Scripture that Jesus had to rise from the dead.*" They didn't get it. Yet.

Mary stays – and she *does* get it. She is first to discover *the meaning* of the empty tomb. The resurrection is God's "Yes" to the world's "No." And she's the first to discover just how intensely personal this resurrection is.

"Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus simply calls her name. "*Mary,*" he says, as he must have done a hundred times before. And then she *knows...*

Not only is he alive, he is there for those who love him. As real, as close, and as personal as the embrace they share, before Jesus, gently but firmly, urges her not to keep clinging to him – but to take what she now knows with all her mind and heart and soul to everyone else in her life... to touch them as Jesus has so touched her.

And Jesus gives her a personal mission: "Go to my brothers and sisters and tell them, 'I'm going up to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.""

And so Mary, the first herald of the Resurrection of *Sar-Shalom*, the Prince of Peace, becomes the first Christian missionary – the herald also of the Ascension... "*So Mary Magdalene went and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord; and spoke to them of what he had told her.*" That's our call too. Each and every one of us.

The power of the risen Christ be with you, and all you are called to know and love, this Easter and for all your time here on Earth.

Celebrating Palm Sunday at my home church of Dunvegan in the parish of Bracadale, Duirinish & Snizort on the Isle of Skye was encouraging. Why? Because the last time I worshipped here the building was half empty, whereas today it was full. And there was the happy sound of children playing, where before there were none. Indeed, it was announced that Boys Brigade would be starting up again and something for the girls too. Hope was in the air.

Now I know that between Palm Sunday and Easter comes Good Friday. The crowd that welcomed Jesus into the city with cheers changed its tune to jeers, once everyone realised that Jesus wasn't about to submit to their expectations, which they had confused with God's greater purposes. We too succumb to anger when people fail to live up to our expectations. Eventually those closest to Jesus would understand that God has a bigger agenda than making one nation great again. His purpose is to redeem the whole of creation!

In the afternoon there was an inter-church gathering in the community hall. This too was a novelty. Instead of competing for the diminishing constituency of church-goers, we were all rallying around to support each other in our quest to make new disciples and to marvel at the power of God to transform lives. A local farmer spoke compellingly, yet with great humility, about what it means to be a Christian, weaving his personal story into the message.

Holy Week invites us all to reassess our lives and what following Jesus means to us. Everyone's story is unique but we are all called to weave our journey into those of myriad others on the same path. How we do that will shape Clèir Eilean Ì: Highlands & Hebrides. Like Holy Week our new presbytery will have its ups and downs and also like Holy Week it is a means to an end: resurrection...

Fellow presbyters, despite evidence to the contrary, we are not in the decline management business. We are about hope and faith and progress and growth. And grace and reconciliation. Gone is church life as we knew it. Instead we are confronted with a window of opportunity. There will be mourning and regret and we should face these squarely, grateful for those cherished practices and places that we are leaving behind.

And then we must get on with the business of harnessing fresh resources of people and expertise and technology, applying them to the gifts we've brought with us – of scripture and prayer – in order discern how to be faithful and fruitful here and now and tomorrow.

How shall we reverse decades of decline? How shall we maintain intimacy across such a vast area? Where are all these extra resources we were promised? What can be done to recover the lost generations? Can we be salt and light in communities which no longer notice or care? I don't know. But God does. Let us seek him together and get in step with how he is already answering our deepest questions, fulfilling our profounder desires, making all things new...

Christian Aid Week 2024 – 12-18 May Seven days, so many ways to make a difference

Every Christian Aid Week, people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world. Inverness people play their part and have a good record of fundraising.

This year's appeal runs from 12–18 May and is focussing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods and landslides. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: more than 70 per cent of the population live in poverty and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Christian Aid has been working in Burundi since 1995 when it first offered humanitarian assistance to people surviving the civil conflict. Now, alongside local partners, the organisation helps establish Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLAs). These community-led groups mean people can save and borrow money, making small businesses possible, offering reliable and diverse incomes so families can eat regularly, get medicine when they need it, and build safer homes.



Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA which supports some 25 families in a remote village, in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid-funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where she's building a home for her family. In the next five years she hopes to expand, so that one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. "


This Christian Aid Week – from 12-18 May – supporters are once more stepping up, knowing that every prayer, every gift, every action helps transforms lives.
