Don't Look Back

'No-one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God." These words from Jesus challenge us to examine how our past can shape—or hinder—our spiritual journey.

Reflecting on the past is a universal human experience. Sharing nostalgic stories with friends around the dinner table brings warmth and connection. However, when looking back becomes a barrier, fostering guilt, regret, or an unhealthy attachment to "the good old days," it can impede our growth.

Consider guilt. Sometimes, past mistakes linger, haunting us despite seeking forgiveness. Yet, Scripture reassures us: "*If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us."* God's grace is boundless, offering renewal without the need for repeated confessions. Visualise tossing a stone—representing your sin—into a river. A sign reads, "NO FISHING." Once forgiven, there's no need to dredge it back up.

Failures, too, can shackle us. Walt Disney faced rejection and bankruptcy before his dreams materialised. His perseverance exemplifies the biblical truth: "*Though he may stumble, he will not fall, for the Lord upholds him." Past defeats need not define us; instead, they can be stepping stones to growth.*

Romanticising a "Golden Age" is another trap. The Israelites, nostalgic for Egypt despite their suffering there, illustrate how distorted memories can cloud judgment. Ecclesiastes cautions: "*Do not say, 'Why were the old days better than these?' For it is not wise to ask such questions." Our minds often embellish the past, creating illusions rather than accurate reflections.*

Old wounds can also resurface, masking as unresolved conflicts. Forgiveness doesn't erase scars, but dwelling on them reopens emotional wounds. Scripture advises: "*Rid yourselves of all malice and deceit," urging us to release bitterness and embrace healing.*

Even spiritual complacency can stem from past victories. Paul, once a persecutor of Christians, urged believers to "*forget what is behind and strain towards what is ahead.*" Faith is a continuous journey, not a destination marked by past achievements.

Church communities aren't immune to nostalgia's pull. Recalling bustling congregations and traditional rituals may evoke fondness, but societal shifts demand adaptability. Celebrating history is valuable, yet clinging to it can stifle progress. As Hebrews reminds us: "*Let us throw off everything that hinders... and run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus.*"

Honouring the past doesn't mean living in it. Our traditions are foundations, not cages. God is dynamic, always doing new things. When we trust in His guidance, we can confidently proclaim: "*The best is yet to be." Let's embrace the future, not as a departure from our roots, but as a continuation of our faith's evolving story.*

EDWARD "EDDIE" ADIE (1940-2025): A LIFE OF FAITH, FAMILY, AND SERVICE

It is with great sadness that we note the passing of Edward "Eddie" George Adie, who died peacefully on 7th June 2025, at Raigmore Hospital, surrounded by Adrienne and his loving family. He was 84.

Born on December 22, 1940, in Torry, Aberdeen, Eddie was a proud "Torry Loon" from the very start. After the early loss of his father at age 11, Eddie's resilience shone through. He attended Robert Gordon's College on a bursary before beginning his career as an office boy at an accountancy firm at 16. This was the first step in what would become a remarkable career with the NHS, where he rose through the ranks to become the Director of Finance for the Highland Health Board before retiring in 1994.

Eddie's life was forever changed at a dance at the Douglas Hotel, Aberdeen, where he met his future wife, Adrienne (a Torry Quine). Their shared love for The Boys' Brigade sparked a romance that led to their engagement in 1960 and marriage in 1962. A quiet only son, Eddie found himself welcomed into a lively household as "brother number five" to Adrienne's four younger brothers. Together, Eddie and Adrienne raised three sons, Edward, Kenneth, and Nicol.

A man of deep and gentle faith, Eddie's love for Christ was the cornerstone of his life. This faith fuelled his lifelong, unwavering dedication to The Boys' Brigade, which his son Nicol affectionately described as "Dad was the Boys' Brigade, and the Boys' Brigade was Dad." From joining as a boy in 1949 to retiring as the Captain of the 3rd Inverness Company in 1998, his leadership shaped the lives of countless young people.

Beyond his family and The Boys' Brigade, Eddie was a cornerstone of his community. A devoted member of Crown Church, he served in different roles, most notably as an elder. He regularly sang in the choir.

A passionate football fan, he was also the first treasurer of the Inverness Caledonian Thistle Supporters Trust, where he was remembered as "a true gentleman" and "the voice of reason."

In retirement, Eddie pursued new passions, including singing in a choir, playing golf, and joining the "Tuesday Night Chappers" dominoes group at The Fluke. True to his servant heart, he found immense joy in his role as a driver for The Mackenzie Centre, calling it "the best job I ever had."

In his final years, Eddie faced the challenges of macular degeneration and a dementia diagnosis with courage. He is survived by his beloved wife, Adrienne, his three sons, Edward, Kenneth, and Nicol, and a legacy of love, service, and unwavering faith. Drawing on words penned by the apostle, Paul, Eddie fought the good fight, he finished the race, and he kept the faith. He has his peace. He will be dearly missed.

We don't throw paper aeroplanes around the church every Sunday but Jane Smith remembers Doug doing just that when she was a child, which was reason enough for Doug to make more memories for those at our service this Pentecost, with his 'Flight School'. The message? Like a squadron of 12, follow the Master. "Come follow me," says Jesus "and I'll teach you - how to live, how love works."

The celebration continued after the service with the cutting of the cake with its inscription "Rev Doug McRoberts -Still Sharing the light", followed by a delicious lunch for 100 people which included Lesley and Doug's sons Scott and Struan and their families. More cause for celebration when it was revealed that Alastair and Anne MacLeod were that day celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary! Over coffee and cake, Stewart Robertson shared with us some of his memories from when he and Doug had crossed paths before both ended up in Crown. Gifts from the congregation were presented to Lesley and Doug.

The story of Doug's perhaps unconventional but very fruitful ministry can be read on the Church of Scotland website under the 'Talking Ministry' heading. Find out why the cake refers to 'still sharing the light'; what he did when the family were in Inverness between 1978 and 1985; how he became the first PR Director of British Energy plc while still preaching every week – some of the time in Methodist churches; how his various careers and wide-ranging skills all pulled together when after a return to parish ministry in Keith, he and Lesley moved to Malta. There they found themselves in the middle of a refugee crisis after the Arab spring uprisings in 2011, which led to the development of the project 'Out of Africa' which became one of the Guild's sponsored projects. And up to the present with the preparatory work and the forming of Cleir Eilean I, the largest presbytery in the Church of Scotland, which Doug went on to serve as their first Moderator.

It came just the weekend before Doug handed over the Moderator's responsibilities for Clèir Eilean Ì at a special service in Dunoon, at which he recounted 18 months in which he had led 22 special services – 3 ordinations of ministers, 6 inductions of ministers, and 13 services of union – as far afield as Bute, Caithness, Sutherland, Forres, and Kingussie; two of these services (the last one just the day before the Crown celebrations!) took us back to Dornoch Cathedral, where we were married in 1982, and where our children were baptised. So it's been a very special time for us, and we're very glad to have been able to share it – and the paper aeroplanes – with our friends in Crown.

In case you're wondering about the picture, it was taken when we were sailing on the Sea of Galilee. The boat was pretty much on the spot where the risen Jesus told Peter and his friends to cast their net one more time... and they landed the catch of a lifetime; 153 fish.

A ministry which had started some years earlier with about 120 gallons of water becoming wine, reached its earthly conclusion with a catch so large the nets couldn't hold them all... So, as we thank you all again, please continue to celebrate the Good News in all our lives!

The Olive Grove Customers are attracted to the Olive Grove for a variety of reasons. For some it is a handy small café on their way going into or coming home from the centre of Inverness. For others it is a stopover for a lunch of homemade soup, homemade fresh bread, scones and cakes, at very affordable prices. Many are regulars who have their lunch in the Olive Grove, every week, others are visitors who are drawn in by the sign outside; some of these are tourists, including from overseas.

For all that use the Olive Grove one of the biggest attractions is the atmosphere created by the friendly volunteers who staff the café. The rapport between the customers and staff creates a welcoming and relaxed atmosphere.

There is a cross section in the age levels of the customer base, from the more mature, to young families, some from the Toddlers Group in the church. The young mothers or fathers often appreciate a bit of assistance especially if there is more than one youngster looking to be fed. Here, when time allows, a staff member can act as 'grandparent' helping feed one of the children to ease the pressure on a busy parent. This all adds to the informal family feeling around the tables.

Adults come in in groups of twos or threes, or singly which also allows cross table conversations. At other times, a few minutes shared with those not in company is invaluable and appreciated.

Presently, Team Olive Grove needs additional volunteers to maintain this hugely appreciated service at its current level. The menu is simple, the cooking quite routine, a friendly disposition is key to this equal opportunity. It is amazing how quickly people fit in and new friendships form.

Christian Aid Week 2025

The Christian Aid Week collection has amounted to a Grand Total of **£1918.75**.

The breakdown is as follows (all figures include Gift Aid).

My grateful thanks to the congregation and parish as ever. In fact the amount raised from the parish is noticeably up on last year, which is very encouraging and which vindicates the efforts of our team of some 20 volunteers.

However the grand total is noticeably down. There's no point in beating about the bush – I am disappointed about this. I can't really imagine that my sudden enforced absence from the scene had a great deal to do with this because fortunately all the arrangements were in place before that.

It's true that after being well up to date with my step count until the middle of the month, suddenly it went down from 11,000 steps a day to a few hundred, just toddling around the hospital ward! The most likely explanation for the lower total is that just a few weeks previously, the congregation had been extremely generous with the collection for the Myanmar Earthquake Emergency Appeal.

Anyway the bottom line is that over the two appeals Crown Church and parish have been very generous in responding to the needs of regions of the world beset by problems of injustice, inequality and climate change. We can be proud of that.

Next year I plan to be fighting fit and ready for the challenge again!

Sir Geoff Palmer

Reading of the death of Sir Geoff Palmer in mid June caused both sadness but also an awareness of the privilege of meeting such a remarkable man, Scotland's first black professor, chancellor of Heriot-Watt University, first black Knight of the Thistle (2024) and a powerful voice as a human rights activist.

Crown's link came through our partner North Street United Church in Kingston, which Sir Geoff left aged 14 to join his mother in low skilled employment in London. His life was radically changed, firstly by the intervention of an Immigration Officer who insisted he must attend school until age 15, then by his own phenomenal skills with a cricket bat which saw him progress from a junior secondary 'special' class to a selective school on the strength of the asset he would be to their cricket team! Once bitten by the learning bug, his progress from laboratory assistant to professor (of brewing) was remarkable.

His talk in Crown Church in 2016 on Scottish involvement in slavery attracted a large audience well beyond the church congregation. Such was his warmth and humanity that rather than dwelling on guilt associated with this painful subject, he focused forward on how, when properly understood, situations could be improved by encouraging reconciliation and genuine equality of opportunity.

With personal warmth, there also came humour. Turning to one of our visiting North Street guests with a twinkling eye, he surprised her by saying how much his teenage self had admired her mother, gazing longingly at her over the church pews in North Street. Our guest's grandmother would have none of it, seeing a boy with no prospects ... how wrong she was! Sir Geoff, you'll always remain an inspiration.

The letter below from Lorna Dempster highlights the significant challenges facing the Foodbank and the items that are so very much needed over the next two months.

Dear Churches supporting Highland Foodbank,

Once again I'd like to thank everyone who has been able to donate to Foodbank this year. Your commitment to people in crisis in the Highlands is really appreciated by Blythswood. So far this year we've provided emergency food to 2,500 people, many of whom had never been referred to a food bank before.

The reality for us is that stocks haven't been so low in over five years, and we're beginning to have to buy items to ensure we have enough food to make up food parcels for people referred to us. If folks in your congregation could donate even one item from the list, this would make a massive difference to what we do.

If bringing food to Church is difficult for anyone, we have permanent collection
