THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

As I mentioned in the church on Sunday, on the 24th or 25th of September the Rapture was supposed to happen. This was proposed by a South African pastor, and through the use of social media, their prophesy spread around the world.

So what exactly is The Rapture?

The Rapture is an concept believed by some Christians, particularly those in North America, consisting of an end-time event when all dead Christian believers will be resurrected and, joined with Christians who are still alive, together will rise "in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air" The whole idea of the rapture didn't really come about until the 1830's, but it got a bit more promotion in the mid 90's with the Left Behind series of books and films.

There's two verses used to support the theology behind the Rapture. The first talks about people being taken.

Matthew 24:37-40

The coming of the Son of Man will be like what happened in the time of Noah. In the days before the flood people ate and drank, men and women married, up to the very day Noah went into the boat; yet they did not realize what was happening until the flood came and swept them all away. That is how it will be when the Son of Man comes. At that time two men will be working in a field: one will be taken away, the other will be left behind.

The second talks about rising up into the clouds.

1 Thessalonians 4:16-17

There will be the shout of command, the archangel's voice, the sound of God's trumpet, and the Lord himself will come down from heaven. Those who have died believing in Christ will rise to life first; then we who are living at that time will be gathered up along with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will always be with the Lord.

Now I'm going to spare you some heavy theology here, because I'm trying to keep this under 500* words, and I don't like casually throwing around phrases like "Midtribulational premillennialism" in polite conversation. The edited version is that, over the years, many people have proposed that the day of the coming of the Lord is not just a concept, but is an actual date in the calendar. And over the years, there's been at least one prediction per year of the end times. Some people have taken it so seriously they give away all their possessions, only to find the day doesn't come.

I feel sorry for anyone who was taken in by this false prophesy, especially those who have been persuaded to give away their goods. At the same time though, those who believe these prophecies are truly living like that day will be their last. Perhaps it's a reminder to us that we never know when it's our own last day and to live accordingly. So live a good Christian life, and don't worry about false claims -Jesus will come when he's good and ready.

PRESBYTERY PLAN - CONFIRMATION OF UNION Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Last month (September) your Kirk Session voted to approve the Basis of Union with Crown Church, however, the congregation voted against the Basis of Union. This, however, does not prevent the union. What will happen now, is that Presbytery will enact clause 13.3 in the Presbytery Mission Plan Act. Here is what the clause states

13.3 Notwithstanding the provisions of this section 13, while it shall be the duty of the Presbytery to make every effort to secure approval of the office bearers and congregations involved, the right of the Presbytery to effect Adjustment in terms of this Act is hereby affirmed, subject to the written consent of any minister or ministers whose rights would be adversely affected (save where the charge has been designated an Insolvent Charge in terms of section 10.5 of this Act).

As the Rev. Douglas Robertson has informed presbytery of his intention to demit his charge on $31^{\rm st}$ December, presbytery can act 'to effect the adjustment', i.e. the union.

Therefore, at the next presbytery meeting (28th October), presbytery will be asked to confirm the union as agreed in the presbytery plan. As the plan has already been agreed by presbytery on more than one occasion it is most likely that it will, once again, be approved.

I want to reassure you, that other than Sunday worship, which will be in Crown Church from January 2026, all current activities which take place in the OHSS building will continue until the new, Midmills Parish Kirk Session carry out a full review of the buildings with the support of the Presbytery Buildings Officer and the Presbytery Finance officer. Everyone will be kept up to date with what is happening. The journey ahead may feel uncertain and even difficult at times, yet, within this transition lies a profound opportunity — to grow in faith, expand our

mission, and deepen our discipleship as one body in Christ. I am reminded of a verse from Isaiah,

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Isaiah 43:19

A powerful reminder to us that God is always working in the midst of change to bring new life and purpose. Though the path ahead may have its challenges, please know that God is at work amongst us, shaping a new future where our shared gifts can flourish and His love can be shared more widely in our community. I pray you will commit to share this journey. Blessings

VISIT BY MODERATOR OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rt Rev Rosie Frew and her husband Dave made their second 5 days visit to Cleir an Eilean I (Presbytery of the Highlands and Hebrides) from Sunday 7 September to Thursday 12 September. She was accompanied by the Presbytery Moderator Rev Janet Mackellar.

On Sunday 7 September Rosie was guest preacher at Crathie Church (Rosie and Dave stayed overnight at Balmoral Castle). Guests at the church included the King and Queen, Prime Minister and his wife and Actress Joanna

Lumley. After the service she made her way to Kingussie Parish Church where the linked congregations of Kingussie, Laggan and Newtonmore gathered to celebrate 100 years since the rebuilding of the church following a fire in 1924. On Monday 8 September Rosie visited Highland Hospice and was welcomed by the Chaplain Rev Norma Higgott and toured the facility and met members of staff. They were particularly impressed with the gardens.

Ness Bank Church (through Inverness Foodstuffs) provided a lunch where they met some members of the congregation.

An afternoon tea was arranged at St Stephen's Church and although the attendance was disappointing everyone met Rosie and enjoyed a lovely tea and cakes. There is a photo in the newsletter taken inside St Stephen's Church with some of those who attended.

The party moved on to Beechwood House (CrossReach) and were shown the recently opened Nevis House which provides an extra 22 placements for those on their recovery journey. The facility expands on existing work carried out at Beechwood House, located next door, offering residential rehabiliation, community outreach and social care to people affected by substance use.

Highland Council generously provided a Civic Reception in the Town House and the Moderator was warmly welcomed by the Provost and other members of the Council. Members of Presbytery, local charities, ecumenical partners, those who hosted visits and a very limited number from local congregations had all been invited and it was a very enjoyable evening with a superb buffet included. It was an opportunity to say 'thank you' to all who serve the local community in elected office and by volunteering.

On Tuesday the Moderator visited Nairn Old Parish Church and St Ninian's Church to learn more about two new outreach projects. One addresses food waste though the Foodnest, a store with a fridge for surplus produce which can be accessed by the community anytime between 8am and 8pm. The second is a community garden being developed in the extensive church grounds with a learning space for sharing and teaching skills.

A visit to West Moray Church in Moray to hear about a union of eight churches into a new team ministry with an urban and a rural minister along with mission churches. She preached a service at Strathpeffer Church in the evening. On Wednesday she attended the Presbytery Conference in Strathpeffer together with online participation and the guest speaker was Rev Tommy MacNeil, minister of Martin's Memorial Church in Stornoway, who used the story of Jairus to inspire, challenge and encourage members. Rev Ken Ross, a Church of Scotland mission partner assigned to Clèir Eilean Ì and based at Zomba Theological University in Malawi where he serves as Professor of Theology and Dean of Postgraduate Studies, was a guest on-line speaker.


The presbytery has raised £3,000 to sponsor a theology student in Zomba and he talked of the importance of training transformative leaders for the church and wider society and how financial support will allow the student to focus fully on their studies.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - YOUNG CROWN (SCO45082) As we look back on the past year, I am pleased to report that Young Crown continues to thrive as a stand-alone charity with a clear Christian message and a valued link to the local churches, including Crown Church and Old High St Stephen's. We remain focused on providing a safe, welcoming space where children, young people, and families can grow, explore faith, and feel part of a caring community.

Interesting times lie ahead with the imminent union of Crown Church and Old High St Stephen's, forming the new **Midmills Parish Church** from 1st January. This is a significant moment for the church in Inverness, and it will

no doubt shape how we work together in the years ahead. While Young Crown is independent, our connection to the churches is an important part of who we are, and we look forward to exploring new opportunities for partnership as the new parish begins its journey.

It is also worth noting that the 9:30 service continues to thrive, thanks to the dedicated work of those who faithfully lead these services.

We are encouraged to see the number of young families attending continue to grow. Their involvement brings fresh energy and innovative ideas, which in turn help shape the direction of our work with children and families in the community.

One of our challenges this year came when our funding application to Seeds for Growth was unsuccessful. There appeared to be some concern or confusion over our relationship with the church, which may have contributed to this outcome. However, we were deeply encouraged when an anonymous sponsor stepped forward and offered to match pound for pound any money we could raise through donations and fundraising activities, up to a maximum of £7,000. I am delighted to report that we raised £6,126, and with Gift Aid added we are in a strong financial position heading into 2026.

Our Youth Worker, Jackie, continues to deliver outstanding work. Her toddler group remains a valued resource for parents and carers, and her work at Crown Primary School is flourishing, with growing numbers attending the Scripture Union group. Jackie also provides support at Millburn Academy, helping to strengthen links with young people as they move through secondary school. She has been linking with Old High St Stephen's through their Sweaty Church programme and is collaborating with the Kinmylies Church Youth Worker, helping her build confidence, knowledge, and experience.

Saturday Night At Crown (SNAC), which runs monthly, continues to be a popular event for our younger members, offering a fun and safe environment with a positive Christian message.

This year we were sorry to lose one of our board members due to ill health. In addition, our long-serving treasurer has decided to step down. We are very grateful for the commitment and expertise both brought to Young Crown and wish them well. I am delighted to report that we now have two willing volunteers ready to step into the vacant roles, which gives us confidence and stability as we plan for the future. Looking forward, we are excited by the opportunities that the formation of Midmills Parish Church and our ongoing partnerships with local churches will bring.

With Jackie's dedication, the commitment of our volunteers, and the generosity of our supporters, Young Crown is well placed to continue our mission of serving the children, young people, and families of our community.

SERVICE MARKING BABY LOSS AWARENESS WEEK

A gentle Christian service for those who have experienced baby loss, whether in pregnancy or infancy, and for those grieving a baby they never had Barn Church 7pm, Fri 10th October All are welcome in this safe space, whether your loss is in the past or more recent, and whether you are familiar with church services or not Stay for a cuppa afterwards or slip away

This service is for people whose experience of loss was many years ago (sometimes they have not been able to grieve for a whole host of reasons, not least that there was less care available), as well as for people whose experience is more recent. It is for those whose loss was during pregnancy, at birth or in infancy. It is for men as well as women. It is for people who have lived with the pain of infertility. It is for people who made a decision to end a pregnancy in the past and have to live with a whole range of complex emotions, often in secret. People supporting someone else to come along are also very welcome. The service will be explicitly Christian, but nobody will be asked to stand and sing, and while there will be the opportunity to light a candle there will be no pressure to do so. There will be some resources available to browse and the opportunity to stay for a warm drink afterwards, or to talk or receive prayer, again all completely option.
